SARG and Russian aerial bombardment campaigns continued with increasing intensity over opposition-held areas in Syria's Idlib, Hama, and Rif Dimashq Governorates. Satellite imagery of the city of Kafr Zaita, Hama Governorate shows the devastation to the town wrought by aerial bombardment during April, as entire city blocks have been flattened (see Satellite Imagery and Geospatial Analysis in Appendix pp. 124–126). ASOR CHI recorded destruction and damage to three mosques and one cemetery in Hama Governorate (see SHI 17-0073, SHI 17-0074, SHI 17-0075 in Appendix pp. 77–85).

In Syria's Idlib Governorate, aerial bombardment was seemingly intensified following an April 4 chemical weapons attack that killed at least 90 people in th
